





Community Development Project

Community Development Projects (CDP) are projects implemented by Good Neighbors to create a world where children can live in happiness and harmony. Backed by the two pillars of "Child Sponsorship" and "Community Development Committee (CDC)," an association of community members, these projects are geared toward building sustainable and balanced development of the community in which children live through education, health, water and sanitation, and income generation projects. In 2018, we worked with 210 CDPs in 36 countries to strengthen the social and economic capabilities of the children, their families, and their community, with the ultimate goal of building a basis for their self-reliance.

Education and Protection

Good Neighbors supports the quality and accessibility of education for children around the world by providing them educational facilities, materials, tuition fees, and stationeries as well as capacity-building training programs for the teachers. In 2018, we focused on an integrated educational program that seeks to improve the educational facilities and services in vulnerable areas to strengthen the knowledge of children, build children's clubs and advocacy campaigns, and thereby enhance ownership and community awareness for the children.

Improving Educational Environment with New Kindergartens

Dong Lai is a small and isolated village in Vietnam, primarily occupied by minorities. Because of its isolation and the lack of social security services, life in Dong Lai is not the easiest. There is also an absolute shortage of educational facilities in the village, forcing the villagers to use the old cultural center as a temporary classroom and leaving nearly 47% of the children without caretakers, which means that they have to follow their parents to their places of work.

Good Neighbors Vietnam constructed eight classrooms, a canteen, and a yard to ensure that the children will have a safe place to receive their education. Once the kindergarten was built, both the children from the temporary classroom and 223 new students were admitted into the kindergarten to receive much-needed care.

Many Cambodian teenagers of Sangkat between the ages of 15 and 18 are forced to work in medical factories or construction sites, which do not require specialized skills, for hard work yet little pay.

Good Neighbors Cambodia built a vocational training center for the teenagers to continue their education and acquire specialized skills. Students now have access to basic education in English and Mathematics as well as vocational training on IT skills to help them continue their path of learning while building their own technical capabilities.



Health Supporting a Healthy Life for the Community



Good Neighbors implemented health projects that strengthen disease prevention and management and nutrition support, improve health worker training, and enhance the capacity of community health workers to ensure healthier lives for children and members of the community. In 2018, Good Neighbors focused on an IT-based health system strengthening project to improve healthcare service management, especially for mothers and infants.

When we had to record the patient information by hand, it took so long for us that we often could not sufficiently care for our patients and provide them with quality services. Now, thanks to the tablet PCs, we can easily access patient information, allowing us to focus on the services we provide and our patients.

The people of Dzonguene, Mozambique, had no access to pertinent medical services due to lack of public health facilities and the reliance on traditional folk medicine. To rectify this issue, Good Neighbors Mozambique constructed a community health post and provided medical supplies and instruments to enhance the accessibility to quality healthcare services. Moreover, it provided training and support to Community Health Workers, who, in turn, worked to improve the public awareness of the community on health issues. The project allowed community members to learn basic health knowledge from the Community Health Workers and improved the public health environment of the community.

In Ghana, patient information and medical records are filled out manually, leading to issues such as data omission and human errors, which in turn leads to incorrect diagnosis and low-quality healthcare services. Good Neighbors Ghana worked together with Samsung Electronics and the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) in implementing a mHealth project, which utilizes tablet PCs and a health information management system called eTracker. The project has allowed access to systematic health services for the community members by improving the efficiency and quality of health information management.

Water and Sanitation Supporting Clean Water and **Healthy Environment**



Good Neighbors protects children and the community from contagious disease by ensuring access to clean and safe water and sanitary environment. The water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) projects have provided support for the local WASH committees and supervised hygiene education and awareness campaigns to help the community members acquire healthy and clean habits. In 2018, Good Neighbors implemented the "Good Water Project" in schools to provide clean water and empower the community to protect their environment.

As most of our students had to walk very far to get water every morning, both their attendance and performance at school suffered heavily. However, once a water pump was installed in the school, our students could come to school rather than going to the rivers to fetch water. New restroom facilities and regular hygiene education helped change the lives of our students.

The children of Zambia's Mumbwa region walk at least 2 km a day to get drinking water for themselves and their families. However, despite the long trek, they can only find muddy water, exposing them to waterborne diseases. Not to mention the time lost walking often prevents the children from attending schools. This was why Good Neighbors Zambia implemented the "Good Water Project" in school, which provided children and community members access to safe water sources. Nine schools received water tanks and water facilities. In addition, the project renovated restroom facilities and provided hygiene education for the children.



The Mirpur Cooperative of Bangladesh is made up of 14 women from low-income families. While the members of the cooperative were reasonably skilled in the art of making products out of white jute (Corchorus capsularis), their products failed to find a steady seller to generate significant income.

Good Neighbors Bangladesh connected the resources and the skills of cooperative members into a new income generation project. Marketing analysis, discussions, and testing processes allowed the cooperative to come up with the "Jute" bags. These Bangladesh cooperative products are distributed in Korea through MERRYCOOP (Good Neighbors' cooperative goods brand), and their competitiveness continues to grow thanks to the donated talents of Korean professional designers.

Korogocho is a slum area of Nairobi, Kenya, and is a dangerous place for children. Because of the lack of awareness of children's rights, children are often exposed to sexual violence and abuse.

Good Neighbors Kenya thus organized the Safe Club, a child club made up of 30 students, for child rights education and sexual education. The children of the Safe Club organized their own puppet play to prevent children's sexual violence in many schools in the area and engaged in street campaigns to promote the values of children's rights to the members of the community.

Good Neighbors provides emergency relief to our neighbors around the world who have lost their homes to floods, droughts, earthquakes, and other natural disasters, and supports the restoration of their community through rebuilding projects. In cooperation with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), we have assisted the refugees in finding self-reliance. In 2018, we provided 15 humanitarian assistance projects to 252,985 children, community people, and refugees in 11 countries around the world.

Improving the Community Environment with Recycling in Chile

Good Neighbors teamed up with Hyundai Motor Company to help protect the beautiful city of Valparaiso, Chile, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, with environmental improvement projects and children's rights advocacy.

Since 2012, Good Neighbors has cooperated with the WFP (World Food Programme) to implement the SZHC* projects, which are comprehensive community development projects designed to solve food issues in Nepal, Rwanda, Bangladesh, and Tanzania through the community members acting as agents of change in their own communities. In 2018, we evaluated the SZHC projects in Bangladesh and Tanzania to verify their achievements.

Support for DPRK

Delivering peace and hope

Reaching beyond all ideological conflicts, Good Neighbors has participated in humanitarian aid to the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (hereafter "North Korea") since 1995 to help the children of North Korea grow up as healthy adults and for the people of North Korea to attain self-reliance. Starting with our children's meal support in Sinuiju area, we have implemented children's protection support, food support, public health support, and agricultural development projects across 25 project areas in North Korea to deliver hope and support toward self-reliance of our neighbors in North Korea and for the North Korean children to grow up in a better environment.


In 2018, we provided 114 tons of powdered milk through the Good Neighbors USA to mitigate the pain of famine for the children of North Korea as well as 20 varieties of medical items for the children and the community members to improve the public health of their community.

News from Support Countries

Good Neighbors creates good change for the world through campaigns, projects, fund-raising efforts, and other activities in our support countries including Korea, the United States, Japan, Canada and Australia.

Good Neighbors Korea



Advocacy campaign of children's rights across the country

GN Korea launched a national campaign to eliminate and prevent child abuse. To promote children's rights, GN Korea executed cooperative projects with the local community and conducted various advocacy campaigns of children's rights across the country. A total of 191,774 people participated in the national campaign and various activities were conducted including policy suggestions.



10th Hope Letter Writing Contest

In commemoration of the 10th anniversary of the 'Hope Letter Writing Contest' for elementary, middle and high school students nationwide, 2,288,930 students sent a hope letter to Simon, the 10th protagonist. The students realized the need for sharing by pledging to make small actions in their daily lives. Simon, who used to work at the quarry, goes to school after the Hope Letter Writing Contest.

GN USA LA Shelter operation and government support

GN USA is actively operating the LA shelter to serve victims of domestic violence and homelessness across the state. The program covers single women and children with diverse ethnic, social and financial challenges. It is supported by the Los Angeles County and the US government and will receive more grants in the future. This grant will be used for women and children affected by domestic violence.



Activities with sponsors

GN USA is working with sponsors such as a youth cultural group, who is donating the money collected from their concerts. Currently, more than 1,000 members are on eleven branches, delivered numerous concert contributions and supported many children through Child Sponsorship with Good Neighbors. Also, GN USA conducted various events for sponsors like a sponsor tour to Nicaragua in January 2018. In November, sponsors from New York visited Good Neighbors Dominican Republic to expand new community development projects.

showing some movies from field countries with VR headsets and have also sold some coffee from "Café de Gisagara" which is a social enterprise managed by GN Rwanda.

GN Japan has provided emergency reliefs to three areas devastated by the heavy rains in Western Japan on July 2018. We dispatched volunteers to

clean houses for victims and provided a study room for children. Through these emergency reliefs, a total of 60,913 people were benefited.

More than 300 people can now drink clean water thanks to the Wishing Well Project! The first well was inaugurated at Chiwena Hope Secondary

School, in Zambia. "We had a serious problem with water but now pupils are happy to fetch it from within the school", thanked Njovu Peter, Head teacher. Students can now focus on learning, rather than spending time walking far to get access to unsafe water.


